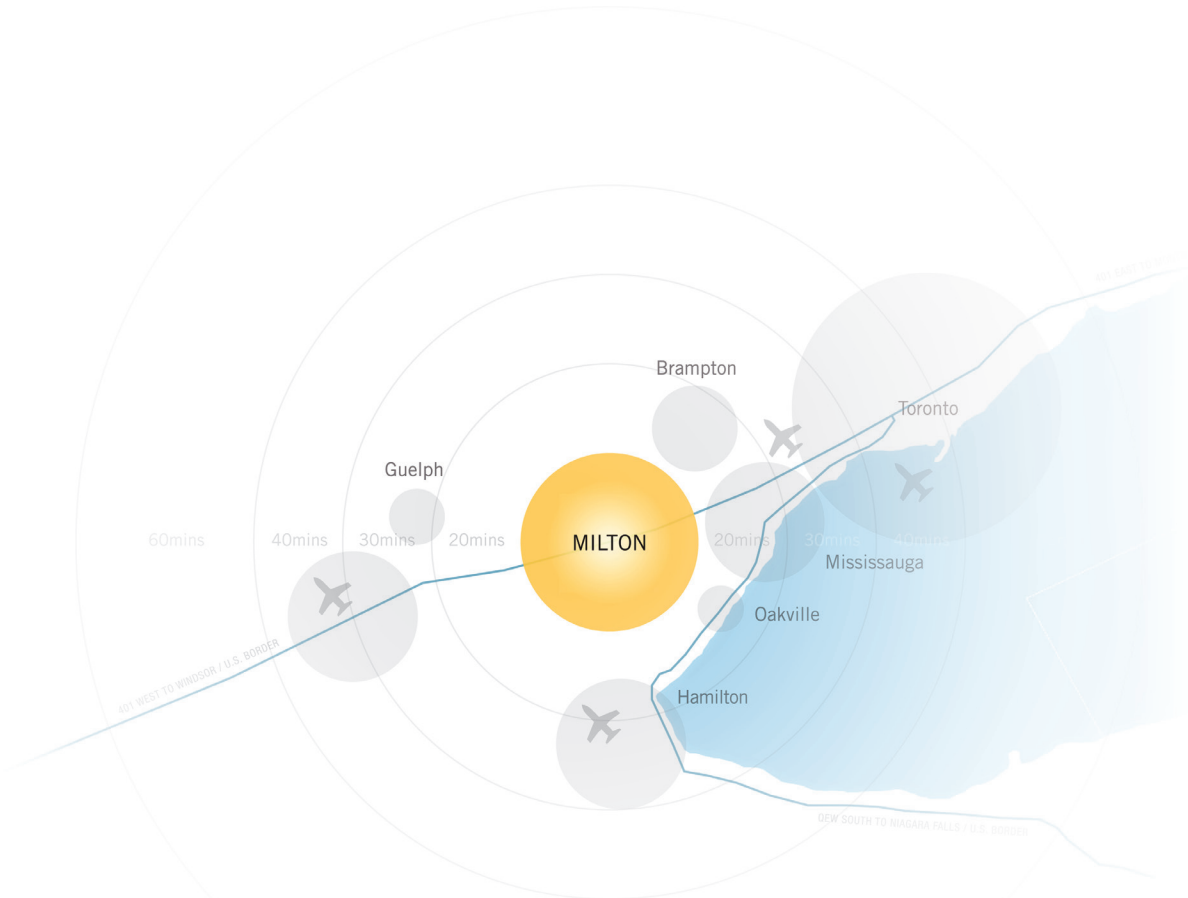

## RAIL TRANSPORTATION

Both national rail lines - Canadian National and Canadian Pacific - serve Milton, with direct freight spurs available on select land parcels. CP's Expressway intermodal rail freight terminal is located in Milton, offering national and cross-border truck/rail service. The town is fully serviced by GO transit commuter rail service to Toronto's Union Station and from there to all Canada / US passenger rail service.

## AIR TRANSPORTATION

Toronto's Pearson International Airport is within easy access of Milton via Highway 401. This airport is Canada's largest, serving 65 airlines and 25 million passengers annually. Hamilton International Airport, recently expanded to handle increased international traffic, is 45 minutes southwest. A local airfield, Burlington AirPark, has also been recently upgraded and serves private and smaller single and twin-engine aircraft.

The 'Milton catchment area' is defined as the area surrounding (and including) Milton, within a 45 minute drive. The area includes: Halton Region, Hamilton Region, Peel Region, City of Toronto, Waterloo Region, Wellington County, and York Region. Due to the proximity of Milton to its neighbouring municipalities, the entire Milton Catchment area acts as one economic unit. Not only does this area offer a volume and depth of human resources and labour pool, it also provides a substantial marketplace for goods and services and resources from which Milton business can draw.
